Now A trip in my "way Back Machine"

This makes me wonder what people did during earlier pandemics before we had these modern conveniences. Which got me to thinking; the last real world-wide pandemic was exactly 100-years ago in 1918-19 when the Spanish flu was killing thousands around the

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world. What did everyone do back then? I wish I had ever asked my grandmother about that time in her life but she's been gone since 1968 and it's too late now. But guess what; I have pictures and a story I remember that took me back and may just blow your mind. Here we go:



The year 1919. was The location, McKenzie Pass Oregon. Mv Grandfather, and Grandmother de-

cided to move to the Willamette Valley from Blackfoot Idaho with the three boys, my two uncles and my Father. This picture from my extensive family archives of Photographs shows them as they made their way into the Valley. It took the family two years to make the trip. That trip today from Blackfoot to Salem, according to Google Maps, would take just eleven hours. Although there were cars by the early 19 teens, they were crude, slow and expensive. My family was not rich enough to afford one. So, Horse power of the real variety is how they moved the family from Idaho to Oregon. They undertook this trip during the height of the Spanish Flue pandemic. I'll bet that they didn't give a single thought to social distancing during that trip though.

I mean, how much more distant could they get than walking and riding part time in three horse drawn wagons. They did make it to Oregon, my father was only 5 at the time.



After settling near Rickreall in Polk County on a small farm they did finally buy a Model-T Ford and had it for a short time but Grandpa

could never figure out how to drive anything other than a team or horses. A story grandma told us was that he tried once to drive the Model-T, got it moving but couldn't figure out how to stop it, hollering "whooh, whooh damn it" while pull back on the steering wheel as hard as he could and he drove it right through the closed barn door. And he never tried to drive again. He lived until 1944 and never drove a car again.

Grandma did get a driver's license in 1921 though and she must have driven the Ford a little because I still have her 1921 Oregon driver's license: Note that there



was no DMV then. Oregon drivers' licenses were issued by the Secretary of State. No pictures, nothing, just a piece of paper. It's a wonder I

still have this. It's a testament to the fact that I never throw anything of historical interest away.

The point of the story is this: They survived that pandemic and we will all survive this one too. Stay safe and well and please don't drive your Vette through and barn doors.
