WVCA Officer Nominations


Dear Members.

Proposed change to WVCA By Laws:

This is part of the process to change the WVCA By Laws for

Section 5.2 DUES which currently states:

B. A family membership will be assessed \$40 annually.

C. A single membership will be assessed \$30 annually.

Chevrolet prices budget-Z06 2017 Corvette Grand Sport from \$66,445

Big Bowtie's midrange sports car will go on sale this summer in both coupe and convertible variants.

When Chevrolet pulled off the cover on its Grand Sport, we were excited to see a solid middle grounder that will exist between the base <u>Stingray</u> and the super-hot <u>Z06</u>. In essence, the <u>Grand</u> <u>Sport</u> is a Z06 without that pesky supercharger. Now, we have an idea of what it will cost to take one home.

The Grand Sport will debut in showrooms this summer with a price tag of \$66,445 for coupes and \$70,445 for convertibles. That amounts to about \$14,000 less than a Z06 and about abrasive protectant \$11,000 more than the Stingray, so it's splitting the difference almost exactly.

For that money, you'll get a whole bunch of Z06-caliber kit, including suspension components, brakes, tire and body upgrades, but it'll hide the same 460-horsepower V-8 under the Stingray's hood. 0-60mph is estimated at 3.6 seconds, and the quarter mile should fly by in 11.8 seconds at 118 mph. The standard transmission is a seven-speed manual with automatic rev matching.

If you want to give your Grand Sport a little panache, you can outfit the <u>car</u> with the Heritage Package, which includes those hash-mark stripes on the fender and on the interior's aluminum trim. A collector's edition will also be offered, with a black-ongray motif and full-length stripes. (*cnet.com*)

Griot's Garage Car Care Tips: How to prevent swirl marks

A common mistake when using a drying towel is rubbing hard on the paint to remove remaining contaminants. This drives the dirt into your paint, causing micro scratches (and maybe some not-so-micro scratches). If dirty spots are stubborn enough to resist washing, follow up with some speed detailer or a shot of waterless spray-on car wash. These products soften and lift contaminants, allowing you to safely whisk light dirt away from your paint. We highly recommend using high quality microfiber towels. Another scenario that may require enhanced lubricity is when too much time passes between the final rinse and drying. In this case, a quick re-rinse is in order.

In some cases, a full rewash of the area may necessary. If you are having a hard time working the grunge out, consider a microfiber wash mitt with a textured surface that roots out the dirt while still safeguarding the finish. If bug jerky, bird droppings, or tree sap are the culprits, you may also need to use a purpose-made bug and smudge remover to punch up your cleaning power.

Bottom line: The drying process is for drying, not eradicating that last remnant of dirt or grime. Stay swirl-free!

Wheel Care

After washing your wheels, apply some wax or sealant to the surface. This will protect the painted surface from contaminants and make it easier to clean the next time you have a car wash therapy session. Be sure you use a non-abrasive wax or sealant and that your wheels are painted and or clear coated before you apply a product. Wax is also safe to use on chrome wheels too!

Wax/polishing

The terms "polish" and "wax" are often misused. Polishing is the use of an abrasive substance, rubbed over paint by hand or with a machine, to remove oxidized paint or take the surface of scratched paint down to the bottom of the scratch, thus removing the scratch. Always start with the least abrasive polish available and work in small areas, inspecting your work as you go. After polishing, wax your vehicle with a nonabrasive protectant

Aside from using a car cover, waxing your car is the best protection you can provide for your paint. Provided you use a quality wax that does not contain an abrasive. A quality, carnauba wax can actually hide tiny swirl marks, and toweling scratches while increasing paint depth, clarity and color. Carnauba wax comes from the Brazilian plant, Copernica erifera, which is farmed for its vegetable-fat wax. It coats the leaves of the plant and swells when wet, allowing water to run into the root area. When dry, it's pores open up allowing the plant, and your paint, to breath.

In its raw form, carnauba is rock hard. Apply wax with a soft foam pad and work in small areas, moving back and forth or round and round. Allow the wax to set up and dry so it forms the protective barrier. Remove wax with a 100% cotton cloth or soft, high grade, microfiber cloth. Never use old towels, T-shirts or diapers as these items are stitched with polyester threads that can scratch paint. Wipe gently, turn the cloth frequently, and if the wax is hard to remove, spritz a little water on the area to soften the wax.
