New Color Coming To Replace Black Rose Metallic In C7 Corvette's Color Palette

C7 Corvette production will go on hiatus when the plant shuts down to <u>undergo upgrades and retooling</u>. When the plant comes back online this fall, Black Rose Metallic will not return.

<u>Corvette Blogger</u> reports Harlan Charles, Product Marketing Manager for Chevrolet Corvette and Camaro, confirmed the demise of the color option. Black Rose Metallic is one of three premium paint choices, which also include Corvette Racing Yellow and Long Beach Red.

"Basically we are painting Black Rose until the <u>plant shut</u> <u>down</u> happens in August and it won't be brought back when we start back in November," said Charles. "We will replace it with a new color TBA, but [that] may not be right away."

The color has been far from popular—the National Corvette Museum states just 1,333 C7 Corvettes have been finished in Black Rose Metallic. In a world of red, yellow and black Corvettes, the hue is refreshing, though.

The date to order a Corvette finished in the color has come and gone; <u>2018 Corvette</u> orders closed on June 12 but will reopen again when the <u>Bowling Green plant</u> goes back online in October.

HISTORY of OREGON COAST RAILRIDERS: established in 2016, uses 7 miles of The Port of Tillamook Bay Railroad which was originally known as the Pacific Navigation and Railway Company. In 1911 the last spike completed the original rail road that became affectionately know as the PRN, or Punk Rotten Nasty by those who worked hard to maintain the rail line. The PRN was later purchased by the Southern Pacific Railway. OCR operates on 7 miles of the original track from Bay City to Tillamook. Rail enthusiasts can also ride the Oregon Coast Scenic Excursion train from Garibaldi to Rock-a-Way. http://oregoncoastscenic.org/.

JOSEPH BRANCH RAILRIDERS, the original company, was established in 2014 on a portion of the historic Joseph Branch Rail Road now known as Wallowa Union Railroad. WURR is 63 miles long and connects Elgin in Union County with the City of Joseph in Wallowa County. JBR uses 20 miles of WURR track to offer a 2 hour and 1/2 day adventure. The railroad crosses through the high mountain Wallowa valley then follows the pathways of the Grande Ronde and Wallowa Rivers that eventually flow into the Pacific Ocean. I f you've ever looked at your car's outside temperature display while idling in traffic on a nice summer day, you've probably noticed the display can vary quite a bit from reality. As Lifehacker explains, that's because the sensor telling your car's computer the temperature might not be in the best spot.

Usually placed in the front fascia, behind the grille, the ambient air sensor will pick up the heat from hot asphalt or concrete. That's why the temperature sent to your instrument cluster or media screen often changes when you finally get out of rushhour traffic or to a location where the pavement is cooler.

The sensor's low location puts it close to roadways, which are excellent at absorbing, storing and radiating heat from the sun. When the sun's energy is blocked or you can get enough fresh air rushing over the sensor, that's when you'll get a more accurate reading of the outside temperature. The Weather Channel makes it clear that this situation isn't exclusive to warm climates or seasons, but the sun can make you unaware of black ice-inducing temperatures on roadways.

You should also note, if you just got in your car, you should have a good grasp on what it was like when you were outside moments before. We hope.
