# WVCA 2016 Charity Donations



The WVCA Charity/Donation subcommittee (Tim Blaylock, Barbara Fuller, Dawn Gloeckner, Julie Hughes, and Cindy Tuttle) met May 9, 2016 and reviewed previous years' donations (2011-2012, 2012-2013, 2013-2014, and 2014-2015). The subcommittee noted that WVCA, over the years or currently, is involved in a variety of charity/volunteer opportunities:

- Iris Festival
- Homecoming Drives
- Driving Seniors for special events
- Collecting Teddy Bears for children at risk of being removed from home during domestic crisis
- Cherry Blossom Run
- Collecting hotel room soaps and shampoos for donation to people in care homes/shelters
- Dog and cat food for local animal shelters
- Marion/Polk Food Share
- Habitat for Humanity

The subcommittee made the following recommendations which were approved unanimously at the general club membership meeting June 2, 2016:

- Charity donations should be for organizations located in Salem and/or the nearby Willamette Valley area
- Charity donations should be made to organizations that use the funds to address the need not to organizations to support administration.

In addition to the budgeted funds for charities and the recurring charity/volunteer events listed previously, the WVCA Charity/Donation subcommittee will plan the following events for member participation July-August:

- Donating a weekend 1-2 hours walking dogs for the Willamette Human Society
- In August, purchasing school supplies (from local stores who match purchases) and donating to students where needed

#### WVCA will donate the budgeted \$400 for the 2015-2016 year to:



**\$200 to** <u>The Oregon National Guard Emergency Relief Fund</u> for cash aid to Oregon National Guard Soldiers, Airmen and their Families dedicated to helping the 'Guard' take care of its own. The program is designed for soldiers and airmen of the Oregon National Guard and their immediate family members (spouse, surviving spouse, child, or stepchild) who are in need of emergency financial assistance. Emergency financial assistance includes; housing expenses (utilities, insurance, emergency house repairs, rent assistance or food); emergency medical or dental expenses; emergency transportation, legal assistance or temporary income assistance.</u>

The Oregon National Guard and the program's volunteer board provides for many of the program's administration requirements, thereby insuring donated dollars go directly to those needing emergency financial assistance. Oregon National Guard Emergency Relief is exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Service Code. Our FEIN is 93-0915051. Although sponsored by the Oregon National Guard, the Emergency Relief Fund receives no direct funding from the government. All donations to the Oregon National Guard Emergency Relief Fund are



used to support Soldiers, Airmen and their families.

**\$200 to** <u>The Marion-Polk Community Cats Program</u>, a cooperative effort among five animal welfare organizations(Coalition Advocating for Animals (CAFA ;Community Coordinator – Feral Cat Coalition of Oregon (FCCO; Salem Friends of Felines (SFOF; and Willamette Humane Society (WHS). The purpose is to more efficiently and effectively tackle the problem of 30,000 stray, feral, free-roaming, and unowned and community cats in the region. The purpose of MPCCP is to pro-

vide sterilization services (TNR) to unowned cats in order to reduce cat overpopulation. (Sterilization services are defined as: Sterilization surgery, rabies vaccination, ear tip procedure and FVRCP vaccination. Other veterinary services may be provided if determined necessary by the attending veterinarian).

Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) involves trapping all or most of the cats in a colony and then returning them to their territory. Whenever possible, young kittens and any friendly cats are removed for veterinary care and socialization, and placed for adoption. Cat colonies that are involved in TNR diminish in size over time. Trap-Neuter-Return quickly stabilizes feral cat populations by instantly ending reproduction and by removing socialized cats from the colony. If cats are merely captured and euthanized, other cats move in to fill the vacant colony spaces.

TNR is endorsed by\_the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA) as "the most humane, effective and financially sustainable strategy for controlling free-roaming cat populations" and "the only proven humane and effective method to manage feral cat colonies." The Humane Society of the United States has also endorsed "community -based Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) programs with on-going responsible management as the most viable, long-term approach available at this time to reduce feral cat **populations** "The American Humane Association is another supporter of TNR. In Canada, the Canadian Federation of Humane Societies supports TNR, stating that the care of feral cats "is society's responsibility" as their wild nature is the result of human neglect. *Barbara Fuller*
