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No More Manual Transmission Cars: Blame "AEB!"

I am seeing many models that already have automatic emergency braking (AEB) on ALL their automatics, but not on their manual transmissions. Last time I saw a major study, automatics accounted for 92% of all new car purchases. Insurance companies are instituting bigger and bigger discounts for cars which have automatic braking. Putting these three things together, **does this agreement signal the absolute death knell of the manual transmission car?**

Yes, it does. Get used to calling it "AEB," for new acronym for automatic emergency braking. The following quote is from Lund, who is the head of the IIHS (Insurance Institute for Highway Safety).

"The evidence is mounting that AEB is making a difference," Lund said. "Most crashes involve driver error. This technology can compensate for the mistakes every driver makes because the systems are always on alert, monitoring the road ahead and never getting tired or distracted." And, according to IIHS's report, "the technology can reduce insurance injury claims by as much as 35 percent. IIHS said as many as 20 percent of crashes could be prevented by the technology. "Do the math. That's 5 million crashes every year -- 20 percent reduction means 1 million less. Those are big numbers," Rosekind said." (Both above quotes are thanks to the Detroit News.)

Recently, ten major automotive manufacturers just signed an agreement for the upcoming use of AEB. Almost every auto industry analyst predicts that AEB will become a NHTSA requirement no later than 2020, but implemented perhaps a few years thereafter to give the last of the manufacturers a time to implement this truly lifesaving system. From, and with thanks to ET Auto.com, "Federal officials say automatic braking can help avoid rear-end collisions, which accounted for one-third of all police-reported car crashes in 2013. Studies, including a recent IIHS report, also show that AEB technology can reduce insurance injury claims by as much as 35 per cent.

The ten automakers are Volkswagen and its luxury car division Audi, BMW, Ford Motor Co, General Motors Co, Mazda Motor Corp, Daimler AG's Mercedes-Benz, Tesla Motors Inc, Toyota Motor Corp and Volvo AB. And besides these ten, there are several other manufacturers currently offering AEB right now, e.g. Subaru. "NHTSA Administrator Mark Rose-kind told reporters Friday that AEB should become standard among the automakers faster than the seven to eight years it could take to develop mandatory regulations to deliver the technology to consumers.


"It's visible and the pressure's on to make this happen fast," said Rosekind, who announced the agreement at an IIHS safety test facility 100 miles (160 km) from Washington in Virginia's Blue Ridge Mountains. The NHTSA plans to make a



series of new auto safety initiatives during the fall, he said.

Only about 4 per cent of cars built in North America this year will have automatic emergency braking, according to the business information firm IHS Inc. Toyota said earlier this year said that by the end of 2017 it would offer such systems in option packages for nearly all its models, with the technology packages ranging from \$300 to about \$500."

Those addicted to manual transmission cars may only have another eight years to buy their last one.
